There may be an easy fix! From **November through February**, City of Smyrna Sanitation will pick up all leaves that have been neatly piled at the curb in front of your property.

There's no need to bag these leaves – the City uses a vacuum-like cleaning device that sucks up the leaves! So, be sure to rake your leaves and place them in a pile at the curb **every Monday of the first week of every month by 8 a.m.**

Or, you can rake and bag your leaves in large brown paper bags and place the bags at the curb every Wednesday by 8 a.m. for pickup.
